Project abstract (as defined by initial proposal and contract):

PURPOSE:

The purpose of the Hometown Forests program was to produce a technically accurate community forestry "user kit by kids and for kids." With El Segundo serving as the laboratory, real life activities of kids would be documented, and packaged as user-friendly, detailed information designed to put kids into action in America's hometowns.

Project objectives:

Goal: To empower young people in America's communities to lead urban forestry projects.

Objective: To document youth led urban forestry activities of TREE MUSKETEERS and disseminate as a technically accurate Hometown Forests Action Kit

Objectives met successfully:

Hometown Forests Action Kit

Objectives not met:

The objective was met, but part of the process did not materialize as hoped. A political swing on the Seguin City Council resulted in a strained relationship with the City, and reduced participation on their part. Our vision included a heightened sensitivity for trees by SCE, and this seems not to have happened.

How did the project increase the knowledge we have about urban forests? How did (will) the public benefit?

By documenting Hometown activities of real live kids in El Segundo, California, the project brought urban forests to life for kids. The user friendly, detailed materials contained within the Action Kit empower young people to organize activities of their own by offering project management tools in addition to technical information. The public will benefit with improved quality of life in communities where youth led projects are implemented, and all of society benefits when its young citizens are competent, productive participants.

How would you evaluate the grant process? What changes, if any, would you recommend?

The grant process began with the partnership spirit of all previous USDA Forest Service grants. A little over a year into the program, a fiscal review turned it into a nightmare. Demands for grant justification of proposal interpretations made by fiscal reviewers distracted significant energy and human resources (funded by the grant) to four months of intense administrative work.

Changes: Have everyone associated with NUCFAC grant administration reading from the same page.
Make grant recipients aware of unique features of the NUCFAC grants.
Clarify the matching funds ratio.
Do not require the match ratio to be met every month.

Comments considered of importance but not covered above:

TREE MUSKETEERS is grateful for NUCFAC funding that made the Hometown Forests Action Kit possible. It is already proven to be a valuable tool for youth and their adult supporters. The diversion of significant staff attention from the program to grant administration, however, came at a critical time resulting in the program not achieving its full potential. Further, the damage done to youth enthusiasm for the program was irreparable. For both reasons, Tree House, which was intended to be an ongoing aspect, was abandoned two months ago.


CLOSING SESSION

Mission: To empower young people to provide leadership in improving the environment in Earth's communities through innovative action and education programs that motivate others to become partners in a united youth environmental movement.

FACT: Founded in 1987, TM is the oldest known youth environmental nonprofit.

FACT: TM is unusual among youth groups in that it is *truly* youth inspired and led.

FACT: The group is community oriented, and focuses on youth-led urban forestry and education.

FACT: TM specializes in preparing youth for leadership/executive roles through empowering training programs.

FACT: TM's *Partners for the Planet Network* serves as the center of communication for the entire youth movement.

FACT: The young founders/leaders of the organization have been recognized by dignitaries ranging from their local city council to the President of the United States.

FACT: TM has succeeded in building partnership opportunities that overcome economic, gender, age, and physical ability barriers, while avoiding duplication of efforts.

FACT: TM has made historical partnerships between youth and adult leaders in government, corporate, and community agencies.

FACT: The organization is a prime example of youth-led grassroots action taking on the role of an influential national corporation.

TREE MUSKETEERS operates three primary programs: Hometown Forests, Young Executive, and the *Partners for the Planet Network*. Each program has its own specific projects and functions, yet compliments each of the others. Therefore, some of the components of each program overlap, forming an effective means to achieving TM's mission.

THE HOMETOWN FORESTS PROGRAM

Hometown Forests began in 1987 when 13 eight year-olds founded TREE MUSKETEERS. Its various elements are mostly concerned with urban forestry in America's communities--by kids and for kids. Individual projects within the Hometown Forests Program include:

- ◆ **MEMORY ROW-** a park-like strip of land covered with trees planted by individuals of the community in memory of a person/event. Each tree is planted with a plaque.
- ◆ **TREE HOUSE-** a .66-acre plot of land which is being developed by a committee of local kids into an outdoor community classroom.
- ◆ **ACTION KIT-** The culmination of this program will be an educational community forestry action kit containing communication and management tools for implementing local hometown projects. This package will be made available to kids, free of charge, at & following the 1995 *Partners for the Planet* Youth Summit.

THE YOUNG EXECUTIVE PROGRAM

The Young Executive Program serves as an innovative multi-level educational model ensuring that skills of the young executives keep pace with their rapidly growing agency. In this program, kids learn by doing as they run their own corporation. These young executives then teach other kids such qualities as leadership, personal development, and the skills necessary to support environmental activities. Some components of the program are:

- ◆ **INSTRUCTIONAL LITERATURE-** developed by and for kids
- ◆ **SPEAKERS' BUREAU-** addresses audiences of children and adults in the community, all speakers receive Toastmasters training.

NATIONAL PARTNERS FOR THE PLANET NETWORK

The Partners for the Planet Network Program serves functions and is the vehicle by which the hometown example of TREE MUSKETEERS is delivered to kids in the nation's communities. It provides a pivot point for young activists, the private sector, government agencies, and nonprofits to become Partners for the Planet. Projects administered by TREE MUSKETEERS in cooperation with their Partners include:

- ◆ **PARTNERS FOR THE PLANET YOUTH SUMMITS-** regional and national events serve as a unifying force designed to create synergy and ongoing dialogue nationally among young activists while bringing cohesiveness to the youth environmental movement and leaving individual organizations intact. 1993=Cincinnati, OH; 1995=Snowbird, UT; 1997=?
- ◆ **NATIONAL SPEAKERS' BUREAU-** attracts invitations to address large and small audiences of youth and adults across the nation.
- ◆ **800-HOTLINE-** allows youngsters and adult partners toll-free access to the national youth movement.
- ◆ **GRASSROOTS YOUTH MAGAZINE-** by youth and for youth, this bi-monthly magazine features outstanding organizations, companies, and individuals involved with the youth movement, as well as fun and interesting environmental news.
